The British Council estimates that by the year 2020 nearly 2,000,000,000 people will be studying English. In many countries, the basic requirement for becoming an English teacher is simply a bachelor's degree in any subject. Because of this, many people with no training in education and especially TESOL have become English teachers over the past decade. The master of arts in TESOL will enable these experienced English teachers to gain an educational foundation in teaching English.

Entry Requirements

To join this program, an applicant needs to hold a Bachelor's degree in any field.

Learning Environment

All courses in this program offered on our Moodle Learning Platform, and through this platform, there will be a teacher to student and teacher to teacher interaction. These interactions will come through video, chat and forum discussion.



Program Completion

A minimum of 36 credits is necessary t qualify for completion of the program.

The program consists of two semesters and one summer session per year:

Semester 1	August through December
Semester 2	January through May
Summer Session	June through July

The maximum number of credits a student can take per semester is 21, and a maximum of 9 credits in the summer session.

The student must complete the requirements for graduation within five years.

2. Elective Courses (9 Credits)

Teaching English to Younger Learners

3 Credits

Issues and practices of teaching ESL/EFL to very young learners, including developmental psychology, age-appropriate languages tasks and assessment procedures and classroom management.

Teaching English Grammar

3 Credits

This module looks at the principles, procedures and required materials for teaching English grammar skills to learners of English as a second language.

Teaching Reading 3 Credits

This module looks at the principles, procedures and required materials for teaching English reading skills to learners of English as a second language.

Teaching Writing 3 Credits

Here we will look at the principles, procedures and required materials for teaching English writing skills to learners of English as a second language.

Teaching Listening and Speaking

3 Credits

Here we will look at the principles, procedures and required materials for teaching English listening and speaking skills to learners of English as a second language.

Introduction to Linguistics

3 Credits

An introduction to the study of language. This course covers its structure, history, acquisitions, variability and neurological basis.

Language Acquisition

3 Credits

This course is an examination of sociolinguistic and psycholinguistic aspects of first and second language learning and specific research into the acquisition of second languages.

Phonology 3 Credits

All aspects of phonetics and phonology are examined in this module. This includes pronunciation and the way sounds are formed, stress, rhythm and intonation. All of which will be applied in learning.



Morphology and Syntax

3 Credits

The study of morphology (the study of word forms) and syntax (the study of sentence structure).

Classroom Management

3 Credits

Our in-depth study of effective classroom management practices will help our students gain an understanding of the specific applications required to control and manage a classroom successfully.

Study Plan
